### **Current SWRCSD Protocols for Student Cell Phone Use**



#### Student Cell Phone Usage

Dear Parents and Guardians.

Research shows that cell phones in classrooms are a distraction for individual learning as well as the overall classroom environment. Certainly, we have all witnessed the distractions that cell phones can cause children in all areas of their lives. By taking steps to limit cell phone usage in school, we can assist students in fully participating in lessons and being truly present in class. Student engagement in learning is a top priority in our classrooms and paying attention does impact achievement. With the implementation of the 1-1 Chromebook program in our schools, students are able to access any digital resource during instructional time that may be needed for learning and as such there is no instructional need for cell phones.

Please see below for the District cell phone use protocols:

- At the High School, students are not permitted to have their cell phones or accessories out,
  or in use, while in classrooms unless expressly permitted by the classroom teacher. Sound
  alerts and notifications must be turned off while in class. Students will also be strongly
  encouraged to turn off silent notifications and alerts during class time as these are also
  proven to be distractions to learning. High school students may access their cell phones
  when they are not in an instructional period.
- At the Prodell Middle School, Wading River School and Miller Avenue School, cell phones
  may be brought to school, but are not permitted to be out or utilized during the regular school
  day at any time.

Please take a moment to review these cell phone protocols with your children and to remind them of appropriate cell phone use in school and on the bus. 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At the **Prodell Middle School, Wading River School and Miller Avenue School**, cell phones may be brought to school, but are **not permitted to be out or utilized** during the regular school day at any time.



## **Teacher Survey Findings**

- Smartphones are a constant distraction that take students' attention away from lessons and disrupt the learning environment.
- The presence of personal devices (smartwatches, air pods) has negative effects on academic performance and social skills.
- It is challenging and time consuming to constantly monitor and enforce current smartphone protocols during instruction.
- Teachers called for clearer, more consistent protocols and enforcement of personal device rules for all grade levels.
- K-12 concern.

"Cell phones are a major distraction in the classroom. With Chromebooks available to all students, there should not be a reason to have cell phones in the classroom during instructional time."

"Smartwatches are cell phones. They should not be allowed in class. I've had third graders texting parents to get picked up early. They are playing games and texting each other. It's not only distracting, it's a safety concern."

"High school students are absolutely addicted to their phones and cannot go more than a few minutes without checking them. It is a real source of distraction for students at the high school level."



# U.S. Surgeon General: Why I'm Calling for a Warning Label on Social Media Platforms


"The rest of society can play a role also. Schools should ensure that classroom learning and social time are phone-free experiences. Parents, too, should create phone-free zones around bedtime, meals and social gatherings to safeguard their kids' sleep and real-life connections — both of which have direct effects on mental health. And they should wait until after middle school to allow their kids access to social media. This is much easier said than done, which is why parents should work together with other families to establish shared rules, so no parents have to struggle alone or feel guilty when their teens say they are the only one who has to endure limits."

"It is time to require a surgeon general's warning label on social media platforms, stating that social media is associated with significant mental health harms for adolescents."



## "Brain Drain: The Mere Presence of One's Own Smartphone Reduces Available Cognitive Capacity"

Participants turned off their phones. While they performed memory tasks, some could keep their phone with them and some had to put it in the other room. Those who had the phone with them did significantly worse on the tasks. The attention and energy it takes to not check a phone seems to cause "brain drain."





### Personal Device Protocols for 2024-25

- **1.Grades K-5:** All personal devices are prohibited from being brought to school.
- **2.Grades 6-8:** Personal devices may be brought to school, but are required to be stored in student lockers during regular school hours.
- **3.Grades 9-12:** Personal devices may be brought to school, but are not permitted on students' persons during class time. Upon entering each classroom, students must "check in" all personal devices including smartphones, smartwatches, smart rings, wireless earbuds, and any other communication-capable devices, by placing them in a designated storage system. Devices can be retrieved after class. Students leaving the classroom for the restroom may not take their devices with them. As an alternative, students have the option to secure their devices in their assigned lockers for the duration of the school day.
- **4.Medical Conditions:** Students with documented medical conditions requiring continual device access may request an accommodation.



# Code of Conduct: Progressive Discipline on the Use of Personal Devices:

#### **First Offense:**

- 1. Student sent to administration by classroom teacher
- 2. Device confiscated and returned to the student at the end of the school day
- 3. Parent/guardian notification

#### **Second Offense:**

- 1. Student sent to administration by classroom teacher
- 2. Device confiscated
- 3. Parent/guardian required to retrieve device

#### Third Offense and beyond:

- 1. Student sent to administration by classroom teacher
- 2. Student considered insubordinate
- 3. Device confiscated
- 4. Parent/guardian required to retrieve device
- 5. Loss of device privileges on school grounds for 1 week or longer

Note: The proposed consequences are to be implemented at the start of the school year for all grades K-12. However, for grades 9-12, a gradual implementation period will be implemented for September, allowing high school students a few weeks to adjust to the new policy.



### **Additional Education**

- 1.Additional recommendations discussed at the forums included: Providing students with education on productive personal device management.
- 2. Further exploration of lockable personal pouch storage systems for use during school hours.





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
